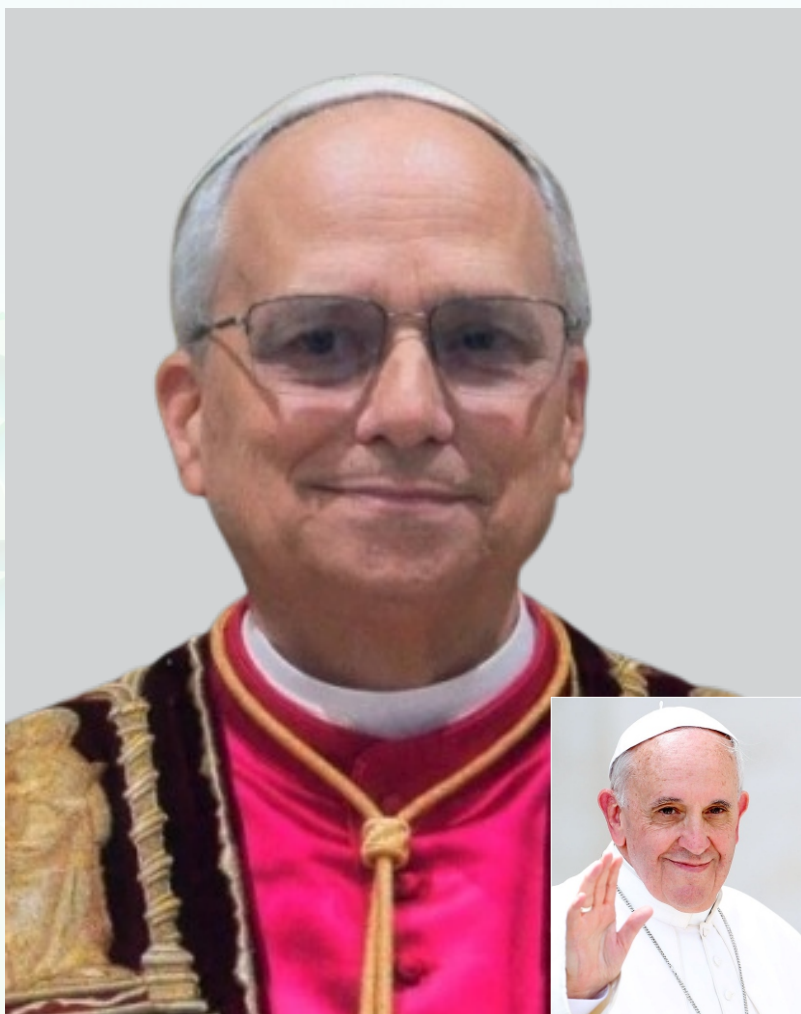

DAY ONE

(Children's Day/Jubilee for Children)



Topic: Share with Gentleness the Hope that is in Your Hearts

Scripture Reference:

Let your speech always be gracious, seasoned with salt, so that you may know how you ought to answer each person. (Colossians 4:6)

A. Reflection (Sermon for today)

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

1. Today, we begin the COMMUNICATIONS WEEK (ComWEEK) in Nigeria as directed by all our Catholic bishops. This will last the whole week, culminating in the WORLD COMMUNICATION DAY (WCD) next Sunday. We have a whole lot of reflections lined up to help us understand the important message of Pope Francis for the 2025 World Communications Day: "Share with gentleness the hope that is in your hearts." This will hold in all parishes in Nigeria, as much as possible, throughout the week, preferably during the evening Masses. We strongly urge everyone of us to try participate in the programme because knowledge of the media in our world today is no longer an optional matter, but compulsory. In our world today, no one can be considered to be truly literate, irrespective of academic qualification, if he lacks media literacy. Everyone needs media literacy to navigate today's world either as sodality groups, or as a family at home, on online platforms, or, at worst, individually.
2. In line with the theme for this year, our Christian faith is not just a personal matter, but a message of hope that we are called to share with others. This is because, as Christians, we are ambassadors of Christ (2 Corinthians 5:20), called to spread the Good News of salvation to all nations (Matthew 28:19). However, we are not just called to share the message of Christ; we are also

called to share it with gentleness.

3. What does it mean to share with gentleness? It means to share our faith with kindness, compassion, and respect for others. It means to listen actively to others, to understand their perspectives, and to respond in a way that is thoughtful and considerate. In our world today, we are often surrounded by noise, anger, and division. We are constantly bombarded with messages that seek to divide us, to make us angry, and to turn us against each other. But as Christians, we are called to be different. We are called to be messengers of hope, of love, and of gentleness (Romans 15:13).
4. So, how can we share our faith with gentleness in our daily lives? We can start by being more mindful of our words and actions generally in our physical interactions and online. We can seek to listen more and to speak less. James 1:19-20 says: "Know this, my beloved brothers: let every person be quick to hear, slow to speak, slow to anger; for the anger of man does not produce the righteousness of God." This verse underscores the importance of listening and controlling our speech, especially in situations where we may feel angry or frustrated. In our online interactions, it means to be slow to kick the Proverbs 10:19 which says: "When words are many, transgression is not lacking, but whoever restrains his lips is prudent." This self-discipline is the foundation for striving to understand others' perspectives, even when we disagree with them.
5. We can also share our faith with gentleness by being more present or available to others. We can put away our phones and other devices, and simply be with others; especially our kids and the vulnerable. We must teach them to do the same. As a family and individually, we need to learn to have media fast and media diets. We need to have can look at one another in the eye, and show that we care.
6. Finally, we can share our faith with gentleness by praying for others and sharing soul-lifting messages online. We can pray for those who are struggling, for those who are hurting, and for those who are searching for hope. We can do this by sharing prayer points or positive thoughts through

our phones, while shunning unwholesome messages. We must strive to avoid sharing negative messages.

7. As we reflect on the message of Pope Francis throughout this week of Communications Week, let us remember that our Christian faith is a message of hope that we are called to share with others. Let us strive to share this message with gentleness, with kindness, and with respect for others. Our Lord Jesus Christ charges us thus: "You are the light of the world. A town built on a hill cannot be hidden. Neither do people light a lamp and put it under a bowl. Instead, they put it on its stand, and it gives light to everyone in the house. In the same way, let your light shine before others, that they may see your good deeds and glorify your Father in heaven" (Matthew 5:14-16).
8. May we be inspired by the words of St. Francis of Assisi, who said, "Preach the Gospel at all times, and when necessary, use words." May we preach the Gospel with our lives, and may we share the hope that is in our hearts with gentleness in our online presence and participation. Amen.
Wishing you all a Happy and refreshing Communications Week to you all.

B. Practical Actions:

As an Individual:

1. Practice media fast and check your media diets to reduce distractions and increase quality time with family and friends.
2. Share prayer points or positive thoughts through social media, while avoiding unwholesome messages.
3. Reflect on your own words and actions, seeking to be more mindful and gentler in your interactions with others.

As a Family:

1. Designate media-free moments, such as during meals or family game nights.
2. Engage in activities that promote quality time together, such as going for walks or having family discussions.
3. Teach children the importance of gentleness and respect in their online and offline interactions.

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4. Pray together as a family, sharing prayer points or positive thoughts.

As a Parish Community:

1. Ensure active participation in the Communication Week programme following the laid down guideline in the manual. www.comweeknigeria.com
2. Encourage parishioners to share their stories and experiences of hope and faith.
3. Create a social media campaign that promotes positive and uplifting messages, using hashtags to track and share the content.

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DAY TWO

Monday 26 May, 2025



Topic: The Gentle Witness: Sharing Our Faith and Hope Online

Scripture Reference:

Let your speech always be gracious, seasoned with salt, so that you may know how you ought to answer each person (Colossians 4:6).

A. Reflection

1. Introduction

As Christians, we are called to be witnesses of our faith and hope in the world. In today's digital age, this means being present online and sharing our faith and hope with others in a way that is authentic, respectful, and compelling. We need to be online because, "The internet is a gift of God, but it is also a responsibility" (Pope Benedict XVI).

2. The Importance of Gentleness

In his message for the 2025 World Communications Day, Pope Francis emphasises the importance of gentleness in our online interactions. He reminds us that "the digital world is not a separate reality, but an integral part of our daily lives" and that "our online presence can be a reflection of our Christian witness." Therefore, as Christians, we are called to be gentle in our online interactions, just as we are called to be gentle in our face-to-face interactions. This means being respectful, kind, and compassionate in our online communication.

3. Authenticity, Respect, and Compelling Witness

So, how can we share our faith and hope online in a way that is authentic, respectful, and compelling?

a. Be Authentic: Be true to yourself and your faith. Don't pretend to be someone you are not or try to present a false image of yourself or your faith.

- b. Be Respectful: Treat others with respect and kindness, even if you disagree with them. Avoid using inflammatory language or personal attacks.
- c. Be Compelling: Share your faith and hope in a way that is engaging and compelling. Use stories, images, and videos to illustrate your points and make your message more relatable.

B. Practical Questions for Group Discussion

Step 1: Reflect on Your Online Presence

Reflect on your online presence, including your social media profiles, status and online interactions. Ask yourself:

- a. How do I currently share my faith and hope online?
- b. Are there areas where I can improve or be more intentional?
- c. How can I use my online presence to be a more effective witness of my faith?

Step 2: Create a Compelling Online Witness

Consider creating a social media post or video that shares your faith and hope with others. Be authentic, respectful, and compelling in your message. Ask yourself: What story can I share about how my faith has impacted my life?

- a. How can I use images, videos, or other multimedia to make my message more engaging?
- b. What call to action can I include to encourage others to engage with my message?

Step 3: Engage Respectfully with Others Online

Look for opportunities to engage with others online in a respectful and compassionate manner. Ask yourself:

- a. How can I respond to others' posts or comments in a way that is respectful and thoughtful?
- b. Are there any online communities or forums where I can engage with others who share similar interests or passions?
- c. How can I use my online interactions to build bridges and foster greater understanding and respect?

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FINAL THOUGHT:

As Christians in the digital age, our challenge is not to shout louder, but to whisper truth, kindness, and compassion into the online spaces we inhabit.



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DAY THREE

Tuesday 27 May, 2025



Topic: Creating a Safe Online Space: Fostering a Culture of Respect, Empathy, and Kindness in Our Digital Interactions?

Scripture Reference:

Colossians 3:12-14: *"Put on then, as God's chosen ones, holy and beloved, compassionate hearts, kindness, humility, meekness, and patience, bearing with one another and, if one has a complaint against another, forgiving each other; as the Lord has forgiven you, so you also must forgive."*

A. Reflection

1. Introduction

In his message for the 2025 World Communications Day, Pope Francis reminds us that as Christians, we are called to create a safe and welcoming online space where people can feel comfortable sharing their thoughts, feelings, and experiences. How can we foster a culture of respect, empathy, and kindness in our digital interactions?

2. The Importance of Respect

Respect is a fundamental aspect of any healthy relationship, including our online interactions. When we respect others, we create a safe space for them to share their thoughts and feelings. We can show respect online by:

- a. Listening actively and responding thoughtfully
- b. Avoiding judgmental or critical language
- c. Being conscious of the human person, not just focused on the argument

3. The Power of Empathy

Empathy is the ability to understand and share the feelings of others. When we empathize with others online, we create a sense of connection and community. We can show empathy online by:

- a. Asking open-ended questions to encourage sharing (Eg. "How has your

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faith helped you go through a difficult challenge or experience?" This question is open-ended because it can't be answered with a simple "yes" or "no". It encourages the person to share his/her thoughts, feelings, and experiences. And it shows that you are interested in their story and willing to listen.

- b. Sharing personal experiences to indicate how God manifested His power in your life in very miraculous ways.
- c. Offering words and prayers of encouragement and support to those we encounter; especially the weak, suffering and the vulnerable.

4. The Transforming Power of Kindness

Kindness has the power to transform our online interactions and create a positive, uplifting environment. When we show kindness online, we reflect the love and compassion of Christ. We can show kindness online by:

- a. Offering words of affirmation and appreciation; even with emoticons
- b. Sharing inspiring stories and uplifting content
- c. Being patient and understanding in our interactions

5. Practical Tips for Creating a Safe Online Space

- a. Set clear boundaries and guidelines: Establish clear rules for online engagement to ensure a safe and respectful environment.
- b. Use respectful language: Avoid using language that is judgmental, critical, or hurtful.
- c. Listen actively: Take the time to read and respond thoughtfully to online comments and messages.
- d. Show empathy and kindness: Look for opportunities to show understanding, compassion, and kindness in your online interactions.

B. Practical Questions for Group Discussion

Here are three practical questions for group discussion:

- a. Think of a recent online interaction where you felt disrespected or unheard. How could you have responded in a way that showed respect and empathy? What can you learn from the experience?

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b. How can you intentionally show kindness and compassion in your online interactions this week? Share one specific action step you can take, such as sharing an uplifting post or offering words of encouragement.

c. What are some ways you can create a safe and welcoming online space for others? Discuss specific strategies, such as setting clear boundaries, using respectful language, and listening actively. Consider setting clear boundaries and guidelines for online engagement to ensure a safe and respectful environment.

FINAL THOUGHT:

As you click, share, and post, remember that your online interactions have the power to heal, to hurt, or to bring hope

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DAY FOUR

Wednesday 28 May, 2025



Topic: Media with Gentleness: A Path to Being Narrators of Hope in a Distressed Nation

Scripture Reference:

Matthew 5:14-16: *"You are the light of the world. A town built on a hill cannot be hidden. Neither do people light a lamp and put it under a bowl. Instead, they put it on its stand, and it gives light to everyone in the house. In the same way, let your light shine before others, that they may see your good deeds and glorify your Father in heaven."*

A. Reflection:

1. Introduction

As media practitioners, including journalists and content creators, we have a critical role to play in shaping the narrative of our society. How can we use our media skills and platforms to promote hope and gentleness in a distressed nation?

2. The Power of Media in Shaping Society

Media has the power to shape our perceptions, attitudes, and behaviours, for good and for bad. As media practitioners, we have a responsibility to use our media skill and platforms to promote hope, positivity, and gentleness. We can do this by:

- a. Sharing stories of hope and resilience. Those positive stories that show virtues of true love, kindness, patience, honesty, respect, dedication to duty, etc,
- b. Highlighting positive role models and initiatives
- c. Providing accurate and balanced information
- d. Avoiding sensationalism and negativity

3. The Duty of Journalists, Media Practitioners and all media users

As journalists, media practitioners and media users, we have a duty to be narrators of hope in our media productions and critical consumers of media texts. This means:

- a. Seeking out and sharing stories of hope and positivity, highlighting the good news and progress in our society; rather than concentrating on negative news, scandals and unhealthy news.
- b. Providing context and balance in our reporting, and avoiding sensationalism and negativity.
- c. Avoiding harm to individuals and communities; being mindful of the language we use, avoiding hurtful or divisive language, and stereotypes.
- d. Being transparent and accountable in our reporting; no falsehood and no exaggeration. Engaging with our audiences in a respectful and constructive manner, seeking to understand their perspectives and concerns.

4. Content Creators as Narrators of Hope

Content creators, including social media influencers and bloggers, also have a critical role to play in promoting hope and gentleness. We can do this by:

- a. Creating and sharing positive and uplifting content
- b. Using our platforms to promote social justice and advocacy especially in favour of the voiceless, marginalised and the vulnerable in the society
- c. Engaging with our audiences in a respectful and constructive manner by not producing contents that debase the human person
- d. Being mindful of the impact of our content on our audiences (On their psyche, mental health, etc).

B. Practical Questions for Group Discussion

- a. Reflecting on Our Media Productions: How can we promote hope and gentleness in our own reporting or content creation? And, what specific changes can we make to achieve this goal?
 - We can promote hope and gentleness by sharing positive stories and avoiding sensationalism.
 - What else?

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- b. Sharing Stories of Hope: What are some ways we can seek out and share stories of hope and positivity in our media productions, and how can we balance these stories with more challenging or difficult news?
 - We can share stories of hope by highlighting good news, progress, and inspiring stories.

- c. Engaging with Audiences: How can we create opportunities to engage with our audiences in a respectful and constructive manner, and what strategies can we use to ensure that we are truly hearing and understanding their perspectives and concerns?
 - We can engage with audiences by responding to comments, asking questions, and listening to feedback.

DAY FIVE

Thursday 29 May, 2025



Topic: Digital Discipleship: Using Social Media to Share the Gospel Message and Invite Others to Follow Christ

Scripture Reference:

(Matthew 28:18-20) *"And Jesus came and said to them, 'All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything that I have commanded you."*

A. Reflection

1. Introduction

As Christians, we are called to be disciples of Jesus Christ and to share the Gospel message with others (Mark 16:15). Pope Francis stressed that missionary discipleship is not just a task or a duty, but a vocation that flows from one's baptismal identity (Evangelii Gaudium, #121). He also highlighted the importance of witness in missionary discipleship, stating that "the Gospel is not merely a communication of facts, but a testimony of love" (EG 127). How can we use social media to fulfill this calling and invite others to follow Christ?

2. The Power of Digital Discipleship

Digital discipleship is a powerful way to share the Gospel message and invite others to follow Christ because the Social media platforms provide a unique opportunity to reach a wider audience and share our faith with others. When we use social media for digital discipleship, we can:

- a. Share the Gospel message with others
- b. Invite others to follow Christ
- c. Provide encouragement and support to fellow believers
- d. Engage in meaningful conversations and discussions
- e. Sanctify the cyber space

3. Principles for Digital Discipleship

- a. **Be Authentic:** Share your real-life experiences and struggles, and how your faith has helped you to overcome them. Authenticity is key to building trust and credibility with your audience.
- b. **Use Social Media Platforms Wisely:** Consider the strengths and weaknesses of different social media platforms, and use them to share the Gospel message in a way that is engaging and inspiring.
- c. **Focus on the Person of Jesus Christ:** Share the Gospel message by focusing on the person of Jesus Christ and the power of His love and redemption.
- d. **Engage in Meaningful Conversations:** Engage in meaningful conversations and discussions with others, listening to their concerns and questions, and sharing your faith in a way that is gentle and respectful.
- e. **Pray for Guidance and Wisdom:** Before sharing the Gospel message on social media, take a moment to pray for guidance and wisdom. Ask the Holy Spirit to give you the words to say and the tone to use.

4. Practical Tips for Digital Discipleship

- a. **Start with a Clear Message:** Start with a clear message that shares the Gospel and invites others to follow Christ.
- b. **Use Visuals and Multimedia:** Use visuals and multimedia to bring your message to life and make it more engaging.
- c. **Engage with Others:** Engage with others by responding to comments and messages, and by using hashtags to join larger conversations.
- d. **Be Consistent and Patient:** Be consistent and patient in your digital discipleship efforts, recognizing that sharing the Gospel message and inviting others to follow Christ is a long-term process.

B. Practical Questions for Group Discussion

- C. Reflect on your own digital discipleship efforts. How can you use social media to share the Gospel message and invite others to follow Christ?
- D. Consider creating a content calendar to help you plan and organize your digital discipleship efforts. (Content calendar means a form of a time table to guide what you wish to produce, and when you are to produce it).

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- E. What opportunities can you explore to positively engage with others on social media?

FINAL THOUGHT:

To be a Christian is to be a missionary; and to be a successful missionary today is to be digitally literate. Digital discipleship is not an option, it's an imperative. Embrace social media today to fulfill the Great Commission and bring the Gospel to the ends of the earth!

Topic: Gentleness in Conflict Resolution: A Media Perspective

Scripture Reference:
